Starting with a look at what a folly is (and what it isn't), **The Art of the Folly** looks at weird, wonderful and (generally) unexplained garden buildings of the 18th and 19th centuries.

Many have entertaining stories behind their creation - find out how to out-do the Bishop of Salisbury, what happens when you put an advert in the paper for a hermit and how to produce a 50-foot pineapple.

Outspeak Russell is a freelance garden historian and has been giving talks on the subject since 2000; and in 2003 he was awarded the University of London Diploma in Garden History.

# 14 JULY 2022 THE SHETLAND BUS WWII

This is the story of the brave Norwegian sailors in their fishing boats who kept links open between occupied Norway and Britain during WWII, taking agents in with supplies for the resistance and escaping refugees out. Not only did they have to face sub-Arctic storms in the North Sea but also the might of the Nazi war machine searching for them. This fascinating talk details the deeds of incredibly courageous and patriotic men.

The seas between Norway and Scotland are the stormiest in the world. No other series of journeys in such bad weather, in such small boats and in darkness to an unlit coast had been undertaken. The impact of the operation resulted in 400 tons of arms and explosives being delivered, 450 refugees rescued, and many agents being delivered and recovered.

Gilly's talk is a moving account of what affectionately became known as 'The Shetland Bus'; helping Norway to bring back its peace and pride. There were many acts of outstanding courage and incredible bravery performed during the Shetland Bus operation. To commemorate this, a wreath laying ceremony is held annually on 17th May in Shetland. Norway still send Christmas trees to London and Edinburgh in gratitude for our assistance.

Mina Jury was transported to Van Dieman's land age 17 for stealing some jewellery from her employer. After she got her ticket of leave she married and had 11 children. However, after her husband's death she then returned to England to appear as a minor witness in the trial of the Tichborne Claimant in 1873. Uprooted from the stable life she had created in Australia Mina went on to live a life of theft and fraud in England.

## 2 JULY - Discover Bromley's Heritage: Victorian Bromley by Bromley Civic Society

A walk around the old town of Bromley to get a flavour of its Victorian heyday, when many buildings in the Arts and Crafts style were built and where Herbert George Wells spent the first 13 years of his life. We will look at the beginnings of local democracy in Bromley and how the town grew rapidly from its market town origins in the later Victorian period.

The walk will take about an hour and a half and will start and finish at a heritage Exhibition in The Glades (near Boots on the upper mall)
