Glossary.

1. Calico or Calicut comes from the name of the Indian city on the S. W. coast of Malabar. Cotton cloth imported from the East. See the shorter Oxford English Dictionary. Calicut passed to British rule in 1792.
2. Journeymen are trades men who had served an apprenticeship but were no longer employees tied to one master; they were day labourers, who mainly lived away from home.
3. Madder is a red dye obtained from the roots of a herbaceous plant.
4. The vestry or parish meeting was the most important local government authority at that time. It affected nearly all the aspects of parish life.
5. Mordant is an adhesive compound for uniting with dye-stuffs to form a soluble pigment which reacts with the fabric to fix the colour.
6. Water Frame or spinning frame – Patented in 1768 (Other sources give 1762 & 1764) by Richard Arkwright 1732-1792
7. James Watt 1736-1819 – Steam Engine design developed 1763-1775
