What the Battle of Jutland did for the Navy:

The Battle of Jutland was a naval battle fought between Britain's Royal Navy Grand Fleet and the Imperial German Navy's High Seas Fleet, during WWI. The battle unfolded in extensive maneuvering and three main engagements (the battle cruiser action, the fleet action and the night action),

from 31 May to 1 June 1916. It was the largest naval battle and the only full-scale clash of battleships in that war. This evening we will discover the impact of this battle from our returning speaker NICK FOTHERGILL

TheGenealogist release New Nautical Apprenticeship Records: We have expanded our occupational records with over 300,000 records of Masters and Apprentices included in a nautical set of apprenticeship records. These BT 150 records from The National Archives comprise of an index that had been compiled by the Registrar General of Shipping and Seamen and its predecessor. It consists of apprentices indentured in the Merchant Navy between 1824-1910. The books have now been transcribed and include colour images of the original registers to add a fascinating resource to their broad range of records which can be used to build an ancestor's story.

BREAKING NEWS IN THE 19TH CENTURY:



An attempt by a mad cabinetmaker to upset the Royal train From the Telegraph newspaper - 12 July 1855

William Groyne, the cabinetmaker charged with attempting to upset the train on the South Eastern line at Tonbridge when Prince Albert and the Duke of Cambridge were returning from accompanying the Emperor and the Empress of the French to Dover, was tried at the Quarter Sessions held at Maidstone on Monday. From the evidence it appeared that the train would not have been injured by the obstructions the prisoner had placed on the line, as the speed at the spot would have been very slow, and the prisoner was acquitted. He said he was unconscious of his actions at the time, but was now sane.

Is cycling dangerous? The evidence of the coroner's court From the Telegraph newspaper – 7 September 1898

Last evening Me John Troutbeck held an inquiry at Pimlico with reference to the death of Annie Marie Byles, aged 21 years, a domestic servant. On Monday afternoon the deceased and a fellow servant went out for a ride on their bicycles in Earls Court Road. The deceased fell off and both offside wheels of an omnibus passed over her body, killing her instantly. Verdict - "Accidental death".

Mr Troutbeck then inquired into the death of Henry James Harwood, aged 44 years, a butler, who was also killed whilst cycling. At midday on August 29 the deceased was riding a bicycle in Hamilton Place, Hyde Park, when a policeman stopped the traffic. Harwood was resting at a

refuge" when his hand slipped off the top of a post, and he fell under the wheel of a cart laden with bricks, which passed over him, inflicting terrible pelvic injuries, which caused his death in St George's Hospital. Verdict -"Accidental death"
