

This veteran hornbeam is in the grounds of Scotney Castle, Kent and dates back to the 1400s. It was planted as part of a wood pasture and it forms a major part of the history, ecology and culture of the Scotney Castle estate.

The hornbeam would have been harvested on an annual basis with the stems being removed at around 8ft, bundled up and then used by the local community as household fuel.

The appeal of the Scotney Castle hornbeam is related to its age. The parkland where it sits first appeared on a map as early as 1597 but the tree may well have witnessed the old castle's construction in 1378.

January 19 Saturday 10.30am - Speaker at Bromley on Imperial Chislehurst

Joanna Friel, Heritage Rep of The Chislehurst Society, is our Guest Speaker today. Her illustrated talk is about the impact on Chislehurst when Napoleon III sought refuge there.

When Napoleon III and his family were expelled from France in 1871 after the country's defeat in the Franco-Prussian War, the imperial family moved to Camden Place, Chislehurst. Napoleon died in 1873 and was buried at the Roman Catholic church in Chislehurst until the Empress Eugenie removed his body to Farnborough, Hampshire.

February 2 - Saturday 10.30am - Speaker at Dartford The Inns of Court

The Inns of Court form the heart of legal London.

Guest Speaker Ian Bevan said: "This is one of my most popular talks probably because people think of it as a secret part of London. The Inns are guarded by large gates and look as though they should be private, but anyone can wander round.

Many of the buildings were originally constructed in the 15th century. The Temple, for example, owes its existence to the Knights Templar who occupied the site for two centuries.

A lot of the buildings were destroyed or badly damaged by the Fire of London in 1666 or more recently in the London Blitz. The Inns have, however, been sensitively restored, so much so that it is often difficult to distinguish the new from the old.

All of the Inns have five features in common, namely a library, a treasury, a chapel, a hall and gardens."

Family History Study Days at the Weald and Downland Living Museum

The Museum is located on Town Lane in Singleton, which is 7 miles north of Chichester, West Sussex.

Both these courses are led by our very own David Cufley, President of NWKFHS. Things about David which you may not know:

David Cufley BA (Hons), MSc, C.Eng., M.I.Struct. E. is President of North West Kent Family history Society. Leads workshops and gives talks to family history and local history societies. Is on the Federation of Family History list of speakers. A member of the Guide of One Name

Studies and a number of other Family history Societies. Compiler of the Brickmakers Index for the UK. Has researched his family since the late 1960s. David is a retired Structural Engineer who has worked on historic buildings.

Friday 8 March: Resources and Research Day: www.wealddown.co.uk/courses/family-history-resources-and-research-day/

This day is made up of four elements:

- a. Basic sources for family history research.
- b. Errors, lies and misinformation. A workshop discussing errors in Official Records and Commercial Search Engines and how to try to spot them. Case studies will be used as part of the discussions. Mark Twain said, "If you don't read the newspaper, you're uninformed. If you read the newspaper, you're misinformed." You could apply this to family history documents. This workshop will give you the tools to try to avoid researching someone else's family as yours.
- c. Mapping for family history research. A workshop to explore how data in your research can be used to create a map of the counties and parishes where your ancestors have lived and worked. By producing a distribution map, you will have a visual image of their movements, which may help you solving some research queries.
- d. Basic DNA for family historians. A presentation that will explore the DNA tests available and how they can help your documentary research.

Saturday 11 May Trades and Occupations Research

During the day we will explore methods used for the selected trades that can be applied to other trades of your ancestors.

- a. Brickmakers and other trades on the brickfields. Including walk around the pugmill and drying shed at the museum to discuss how bricks are made. This talk will explain and discuss brickmaking. Mainly in the 19th century, and how the workforce acts as teams, their wages and social conditions.
- b. Trade sources. Methods to research trades using examples for brickmakers and calico printers. [The 'Brickmakers Index' for the UK will be available on the day.]
- c. Ratcatchers. More than vermin destroyers ... 19th century ratcatchers and their trade, earnings, methods of trapping and the use of the rats.
- d. Calico printers and printing. The trade and migration patterns around the Greater London areas. Location of the trade around London prior to 1840s. Method of printing, the location of the trade and how the workers moved from some centres to others.
