Today's Photo

Nobody has sent me anything this time so I have had to fall back on one of my own photos. This is my father Gordon Dennis GRATWICK as a young man. Born 27 November 1927 (died 1 December 2008), Dad was too young to serve in the armed forces in WW2, but of course he did do National Service and told me he was a nurse in the navy.

That is as much as I knew until last year, because of course when he spoke about it I was much younger and not interested in knowing more - although I can recall dad (who smoked roll your own Old Holborn tobacco all his life until giving up due to throat cancer in about 1992) saying in those days they believed that smoking was a good thing as it killed cold germs.

The interesting thing about this photo is that until last year I had never seen it or any photo of my father as a young man. I was given this by my cousin Chrissy. And the interesting thing about that is - until I started researching family history I did not even know I had a first cousin called Chrissy and we only met in 2018 for the second time. The first time was in 1973 in Bromley and I only knew about it last year when I met Chrissy (for what I thought was the first time) and she told me that she saw me in the Nat West Bank where I was a cashier (and she had popped in to cash a cheque - no ATMs in those days) but she was so surprised she did not make herself known to me. She is 5 years older than me. So how did I find Chrissy once I knew she existed? Good old Facebook. Don't overlook these modern ways of researching. Chrissy has been a great source of photos and family info and I have also been able to share some of mine with her. We've also been able to fill in gaps in our knowledge.

Moving on, I was idly googling and browsing and I came upon this site by complete chance.

Is this my dad Gordon Dennis Gratwick? Gratwick is a fairly unusual surname but I didn't know Dad ever lived in Croydon, I thought he was born and brought up in Bromley.

Or could it even be his dad, Gilbert Jesse Gratwick (1901 - 1973) this is Gilbert in uniform (another photo I only have due to Chrissy).

The SOE's task was to carry out sabotage behind enemy lines, and organise the resistance in occupied countries and, as Churchill ordered, to 'Set Europe Ablaze'. This is a fascinating account of the training and preparation the agents underwent and also stories of a few of the missions, some of which achieved amazing success, whilst other agents were betrayed.

Gillian will capture your interest from the start and, over the course of the talk, will move you both to laughter and to tears.

The life expectancy of an SOE wireless operator in occupied France during this period was just six weeks. The agents came from many different walks of life, including a former chef, an electrician and a daughter of a Brixton motor car dealer.

Saturday 28 September Speaker at Bromley 10.30am Derek Morris will talk about London's Sailortown 1600 - 1800

Derek discovered many years ago that the great explorer and navigator, Captain James Cook, lived in the East London hamlet of Mile End Old Town from 1765 until his murder in 1779 in Hawaii, and that Derek's family lived nearby.

This discovery has led to twenty years of very deep research into the archives of London and has led to four well-regarded books, dozens of articles and talks, and a willingness to lead walks around London's Sailortown and adjoining areas.

The result has been to greatly widen our knowledge of the merchants and mariners, who lived in the area, and their world-wide trading connections, and challenged many well-established stereotypes of these east London parishes in the 18th century.

The London cabbie was an anonymous character. This talk looks at how the industry grew and declined and how the Hansom Cab affected the lives of every Londoner.

Prior to retirement Ian was a professional genealogist with over 30 years experience. He is currently Chairman of AGRA (The Association of Genealogists and Researchers in Archives) the body which represents professional genealogists throughout England and Wales.

He is a Fellow of the Society of Genealogists and has published several books in the Society's "My Ancestor" series including *My Ancestor was an Agricultural Labourer, My Ancestor was a Mormon, My Ancestor was in the Royal Navy* and *My Ancestor was a Leather Worker.*

Several lists, easily word-searched by surname or place. Are any of your ancestors listed, or anyone with a surname you are researching?

There are various possible lists to browse or search eg 107 years old and over or 'supercentenarians' who lived to over 110.

The oldest living person in the UK, Gwen Payne, lives in Sevenoaks, (within the North West Kent area.)

Dorothy Gwendoline "Gwen" Payne (née ATTENBOROUGH, born 5 August 1907) from Sevenoaks, Kent is an English supercentenarian. At the age of 111, Gwen is the oldest living person in the United Kingdom following the death of 112-year-old Grace Jones on 7 June 2019.

She was born in Bromley, and was the oldest of three children born to Ralph Ernest Attenborough (1881-1965) and Dorothy Frances WILLIAMS (1883-1971). She married John Laurence Payne (1913-1961) in 1939, and has two sons.

Makes my Great Aunt Alice PULHAM (January 1909 - February 2011) who lived to 102 (father's side) and my maternal Grandmother Mildred Edith Elizabeth COLES nee SAYLE (August 1909 - February 2011) who lived to 101, mere youngsters.
