#### GILBERT FAMILY SOCIAL HISTORY

NWKFHS member Tom Gilbert has kindly sent in this thoroughly researched article. His email address should any reader wish to contact him to add or discuss information is tomgilbert499@outlook.com

Tom's research has been exhaustive and, even if not a Gilbert, you might wish to read the article to see whether any of the spouse surnames Tom has researched match any names you are interested in.

In 1781 David GILBERT was born in Erith, Kent. He is mentioned in the 1841 Census aged 60 and described as a Ballast man in the Brickfields. As David is not in the 1851 census he must have died during that period - there is a record to suggest that David died in 1849.

He married Ann **LOCK** born 1786 a spinster from East Wickham on the 9th December 1805 in East Wickham. Ann also is recorded in the 1841 census but not in the one for 1851.

David and Ann Gilbert had seven children, all born in Erith:-David 23 November 1806 Thomas 29 May 1808 Sarah 9 May 1812 Ann 8 May 1814 Elizabeth 4 February 1816 Hester 8 March 1818 Harriett 10 June 1820.

Thomas (born 1808) went on to marry a Sarah who lived in Rainham in Essex and he worked as a Lighterman living in Rainham. In the 1851 census no children were recorded and it seems they never had a family. They did however have a servant Job **MEPHAM** from Aylesford, Kent in 1851 though he had left by 1861. They were at the time living at 33 Wharf Yard Rainham Essex. In subsequent census returns Thomas remained a Lighterman and they moved homes. In 1861 at 19 Cottage on the Wharf, and in 1871 lived at 22 Wharf House both in Rainham. Thomas appears to have died around 1880.

Sarah (born 1812) married a Paul **PINCHING**. Paul was born in 1802 and died in 1851 at Lambeth St John the Evangelist. Sarah and Paul appear to have had 8 children: Sarah 1831, Eliza 1833 to 1835, Mary 1839 to 1839, Thomas 1840 to 1843, Ann Gilbert Pinching 1842, Emily 1845 to 1915, Esther 1847 to 1909 and Arthur 1849 to 1901. Sarah died in 1874 in St Pancras London.

David (born 1806) the first child of David (1781) was married on the 24th August 1833 to Ann nee **CLIFFORD** who was born in 1810 at Stockport, Cheshire. David was a foreman in the local Brickworks in Crayford. He died in 1869. They had ten children. In the 1841 census Jenneah, the father of Ann was living in the family home, He was 55 years old and described as a Factory Worker. It would seem that he had been born in Kent. Also at home at that time were the two sons of Jenneah. James born 1821 and Jenneah junior born 1826. At that time there were only four

children in the home at Stoneberry Brickworks.

The family comprised Ann 27 July 1834, Esther 25 December 1836, Emma 7th April 1839, David 9 May 1841, Thomas 30 April 1843, James 8 June 1845, John 28 November 1847, Henry 28 May 1850, Isabella Elizabeth 1852, and finally Charles Henry 30 April 1854.

Also living in the household at one time was a Charles **PARKER** born in Islesworth, Middlesex, who was a clerk at the brickfields where David was the foreman.

Ann went on to marry the lodger Charles Parker and they moved to a village called Upton cum Chavley in Buckinghamshire which today is part of Slough. Charles Parker eventually became the manager of a brick works near Slough. Charles and Ann had eight children:-

Charles born 1855 who became a greengrocer, George born 1857, a railway clerk, David born 1859, a solicitors clerk, Minnie born 1863 and Esther born 1865 who in 1881 was described as having home duties, Kate born 1868, Anne born 1871 and Horace born 1873 were scholars in 1881 but by 1891 no longer lived at home.

Horace in 1891 was lodging in Stoke Poges with the **FRANCIS** family (mother and daughter). At the time of the census he was being visited by his sister Minnie. In 1901 aged 27 Horace was still single and lodging with Mr and Mrs **VINCE** and family in Slough. In the 1891 census young Charles was living in 3 High Street (a greengrocers shop?) and he and his wife Emily born 1867 were caring for their two children - Charles born 1887 and Arthur born 1899 - as well as both the ageing parents.

Esther born 1865 went on to marry a Victor **COLLES** who according to one record was a wig maker from Belgium and she and her husband lived at 46 Achilles Road, Hampstead with their four children Fred born 1891, William born 1896, George born 1898, Dorothy born 1899.

Also living with Victor and Esther was Ann who was widowed sometime between 1891 and 1901. The 1911 census records six children, the four already mentioned and Florence born 1902 and Marie born in 1904. Contact has been made with the relatives of this branch of the family. In the 1911 census the occupation of Victor is clearly a Gun Maker and the family had dropped the "s" from "Colles" and become "Colle"

Esther Gilbert who was born 25 December 1836, in 1860 married Newman **HYMAS** a miller born in 1833 at Springfield Chelmsford Essex. In the Crayford Trade directory of 1867 Newman is described as a Corn Merchant in Crayford. This is the village where Esther was born. By 1871 they were residing in Southwark (see below)

Emma born 7 April 1839 was in 1861 living at home with her parents but by the 1881 census had married Robert **UPTON** in 1864. Robert was born in 1839 in Wrotham, Kent.

In 1871 Robert and Emma were in lodgings at 161 Blackfriars Road, Southwark, the landlord of which was Newman Hymas and his wife Esther nee Gilbert (see above)

By the 1881 census Robert and Emma were living in West Ham at 34 Hack Road. The family then comprised Mother in law Ann 71 years and nephew Frederick Parker 21 years (see Ann Gilbert) who was an Engine Fitter. Robert Upton was a Carpenter and in 1891 he and Emma were residing at 79 Fredericks Road West Ham without any family. Emma died in April 1892 aged 53. Robert was in 1901 an inmate of Forest House presumably a Workhouse (Old People's Home) and he died in 1908.

David 1841 joined the Royal Navy and in the 1861 census was serving as a Stoker on the HMS Clio at Guaymar Harbour off the west coast of Mexico. The Clio eventually became a training ship moored of the Menai Straits in North Wales and renamed the Conway. It has been reliably ascertained that on leaving the Navy, David went to Omaha, Nebraska, USA. It is suspected that he was the first Gilbert to go to there and as a result his brothers, James, John, Charles and Thomas, joined him. The latter returned to England sometime in 1880 having married, leaving his wife Susan in Ware Hertfordshire.

The family became incredibly mobile and dispersed to other parts of the UK and to America.

### From Northfleet Girl to New Zealand Jean Hendy-Harris



I (nee Jean Hendy) was born in Northfleet, North Kent, and as I grew older developed an enduring love affair with London where as an adult I lived and worked for years. However, since the nineteen seventies I have lived in New Zealand where my three children grew up.

Until recent years my writing had revolved around education, how children learn and as a passionate educator and campaigner for choice and change I home schooled my two younger children for ten years.

Following the sudden death of my only brother a few years ago I embarked upon a change of direction and decided to write the book that we had in fact originally resolved to write together, detailing our Thameside childhood in Gravesend and Northfleet in the years that followed World War 2.

Consequently **`Chalk Pits and Cherry Stones**' is an account of cheerful poverty and fundamental deprivation that would barely be recognised today, of food rationing and shortages, air raid warnings and Doodlebugs, overcrowding and neediness, a memoir of a time that is now almost forgotten.

Several similar books have followed, each of them detailing the social history of those years and how one family reacted to the situation they found themselves in. They are available as ebooks for Kindle reading and also as printed copies via Amazon.
