OVERPAID, OVER SEXED AND OVER HERE – THE AMERICAN INVASION OF 1942-45"

This talk will explore the "invasion" of American Service personnel. Over two million American servicemen passed through Britain during the Second World War and over 60,000 British women married them and went to the United States. Many of the servicemen had never been abroad before, the War Department sent with them a pamphlet called *Instructions for American Servicemen in Britain*. This was designed to familiarise them with life in Britain, the history, culture, even the slang. The pamphlet also encouraged the men to get along with the British and It was filled with great advice like "Don't be a showoff," "NEVER criticize the King or Queen," and "The British don't know how to make a good cup of coffee.

DARTFORD - 6 NOVEMBER 2021 "A SCHOOLGIRLS WAR"

An evocative story of school life in WW2 and first-hand recollections of pupils who experienced the disrupted schooling, the air-raids, the doodlebugs and the lessons in underground shelters. This story evolved from two amazing discoveries made at the school. The first was an underground purpose-built shelter situated at the rear of the school. The shelter was a time capsule, a classroom used during air raids, with the original school benches either side of the long and narrow structure. The second was a large and comprehensive diary of wartime school life, handsomely illustrated by the then Art teacher, Helen Keen. The diary has been complemented by Mary Smith through interviewing 53 former schoolgirls about their experiences of school during the war. A talk not to be missed.

New collections

MyHeritage

The Newspaper Name Index, USA and Canada constitutes an index of 982 million names mentioned in MyHeritage's existing U.S. and Canadian newspaper collections. Smart machine learning algorithm has been used to extract essential details from the free text of the newspapers — not only the first and last names of individuals mentioned, but also related details that may appear in the text, such as the name of a spouse or a place of residence. This index covers half of MyHeritage's newspaper collection, with the other half of the name index due to be published soon, adding almost one billion extra records.

<u>The Scotland Census, 1841-1901 collection</u> contains seven censuses from the second half of the 19th century in Scotland, with a total of 24 million records. This collection offers details about Scottish ancestors that often can't be found in other vital record collections, such as information about occupation and residential addresses.

FamilySearch

FamilySearch expanded its free online archives in September of 2021 with over 26 million new indexed family history records from all over the world. New historical records were added from Argentina, Australia, Austria, Bolivia, Brazil, Canada, Chile, Costa Rica, Denmark, El Salvador, England, Finland, France, French Polynesia, Germany, Guadelope, Guatemala, Hungary, India, Jamaica, Kiribati, Liberia, Mexico, New Zealand, Nicaragua, Norway, Papua New Guinea, Paraguay, Peru, Samoa, Sierra Leone, Slovenia, South Africa, Spain, Sweden, Switzerland, Tuvalu, Ukraine, the United Kingdom, Uruguay, Vanuatu, Venezuela, Zambia, Zimbabwe, and the United States, which includes Alaska, California, Georgia, Hawaii, Massachusetts, Minnesota, Montana, New Jersey, South Carolina, and Washington. Records from the United States Bureau of Land Management and Find A Grave were included as well.
