THE STRING OF PEARLS

The String of Pearls is a 'Penny dreadful' story featuring the infamous Sweeney Todd. Penny Dreadfuls were cheap popular serial literature produced during the nineteenth century; first published in the 1830s. A story was published in weekly parts of 8 to 16 pages, for the price of one penny each. The subject matter of these stories was typically sensational, focusing on the exploits of detectives, criminals, or supernatural entities. Other renowned characters featured in these tales include Dick Turpin, Varney the Vampire and Spring-heeled Jack. The String of Pearls plot concerns the strange disappearance of a sailor, Lieutenant Thornhill, last seen entering Sweeney Todd's establishment on Fleet Street. The story is set in London in the year 1785 and is announced as Domestic Romance!

The reality of medieval etiquette and table manners. Punctuality being the politeness of princes, this lecture examines the reality of manners and etiquette in later the Medieval period. A far cry from the popular image of appalling table manners, Medieval dining was a minefield of do's and don'ts, many of which were recorded in courtesy books (Teach Yourself How To Be A Gentleman texts). A rich vein of artistic evidence also survives, bearing out what is written. The lecture deals with the structure of formal banquets and the food eaten as well as how young gentlemen were trained and more everyday advice to women about hygiene and how to conduct themselves. OVERPAID, OVER SEXED AND OVER HERE - THE AMERICAN INVASION OF 1942-45"

This talk will explore the "invasion" of American Service personnel. Over two million American servicemen passed through Britain during the Second World War and over 60,000 British women married them and went to the United States. Many of the servicemen had never been abroad before, the War Department sent with them a pamphlet called *Instructions for American Servicemen in Britain*. This was designed to familiarise them with life in Britain, the history, culture, even the slang. The pamphlet also encouraged the men to get along with the British and It was filled with great advice like "Don't be a showoff," "NEVER criticize the King or Queen," and "The British don't know how to make a good cup of coffee. 1921 Census launch – In case you have not heard!

Findmypast have confirmed that the 1921 Census for England & Wales will launch on 6th January, and the further slightly good news is that they're going to be charging marginally less to view the 1921 Census images than they did the 1939 Register pages in 2015.

£3.50 to view each household schedule and note an additional £2.50 for a transcript –

At 11:00 am on 11 November 1919, the first Remembrance Day, originally called Armistice Day, and the first two minutes silence observed, was conducted throughout Britain and the Commonwealth. Coinciding with the time in 1918 at which the First World War came to an end with the cessation of hostilities. It came to symbolise the end of the war and provide an opportunity to remember those who had died.

The concept originated from Sir James Percy FitzPatrick, a South African author, politician, mining financier and pioneer of the fruit industry. He had a personal interest in the daily observance of silence, as his own son, Major Percy Nugent George Fitzpatrick, was killed in action in France in December 1917. He had originally been introduced to the notion of a two-minute pause to honour the dead when his local church adopted the idea, when details of losses at the Battle of the Somme first came through to Cape Town in July 1916.

In 1919, he approached Lord Northcliffe (the founder of both the *Daily Mirror* and the *Daily Mail*) with the intention of campaigning for it to be observed annually and Empire-wide, however the suggestion was not taken up. When writing to Lord Milner, then Colonial Secretary in September or October 1919, he described the silence that fell on the city during this embraced observance and proposed that this become an official part of the annual service on Armistice Day. He acknowledged that the idea came from the Cape Town pause, saying that other towns followed its example but "nothing was as dramatic as the Cape Town observation simply because of the midday gun". The meaning behind his proposal was stated to be:

- It is due to the women, who have lost and suffered and borne so much, with whom the thought is ever present.
- It is due to the children that they know to whom they owe their dear fought freedom.
- It is due to the men, and from them, as men.
- But far and away, above all else, it is due to those who gave their all, sought no recompense, and with whom

we can never re-pay – our Glorious and Immortal Dead.

The idea was recommended to King George V who on hearing the proposal was enthusiastic and sought approval from the War Cabinet on 5 November. It was immediately approved and on 7 November 1919, the King issued a proclamation which called for a two-minute silence:

"All locomotion should cease, so that, in perfect stillness, the thoughts of everyone may be concentrated on reverent remembrance of the glorious dead."

The first two-minute silence held in London (11 November 1919) was reported in the Manchester Guardian on 12 November 1919:

The first stroke of eleven produced a magical effect.

The tram cars glided into stillness, motors ceased to cough and fume, and stopped dead, and the mightylimbed dray horses hunched back upon their loads and stopped also, seeming to do it of their own volition. Someone took off his hat, and with a nervous hesitancy the rest of the men bowed their heads also. Here and there an old soldier could be detected slipping unconsciously into the posture of 'attention'. An elderly woman, not far away, wiped her eyes, and the man beside her looked white and stern. Everyone stood very still ... The hush deepened. It had spread over the whole city and become so pronounced as to impress one with a sense of audibility. It was a silence which was almost pain ... And the spirit of memory brooded over it all.

After the end of the Second World War in 1945 Armistice Day became Remembrance Day to include all those who had fallen in the two World Wars and other conflicts.

New collections

MyHeritage

France, Naturalizations

1,749,377 records

This collection contains an index of French naturalization records from the twentieth century. Records typically contain the individual's name, date and place of birth, as well as the date of the decree of naturalization.

The decrees issued between 1900 and 1931 were published in the Bulletin des lois (Bulletin of the laws), and from 1924 onward, these were published in the Journal officiel de la République française (Official Journal of the French Republic).

This collection was added following MyHeritage's acquisition of Filae.

FamilySearch

FamilySearch expanded its free online archives in October of 2021 with almost 10 million new indexed family history records from all over the world. New historical records were added from Anguilla, Argentina, Austria, Barbados, Belgium, Belize, Bolivia, Brazil, British Virgin Islands, Canada, Chile, Cuba, Dominica, Dominican Republic, Ecuador, El Salvador, England, Finland, France, French Polynesia, Germany, Guatemala, Hungary, India, Kiribati, Liberia, Martinique, Mexico, New Zealand, Nicaragua, Norway, Panama, Paraguay, Peru, Puerto Rico, Saint Kitts and Nevis, Samoa, Sierra Leone, Slovakia, South Africa, Spain, Sweden, Switzerland, Turks and Caicos, Tuvalu, the United Kingdom, Uruguay, Venezuela, Zambia, and the United States, which includes Arizona, California, Georgia, Indiana, Massachusetts, Minnesota, New Jersey, South Carolina, Texas, Virginia, Washington, and West Virginia. Records from the United States Bureau of Land Management and GenealogyBank Obituaries were included as well.
