Tracing My Ancestors During Lockdown

When Clare Walker set out to research her husband's ancestors, she never imagined the astonishing stories she would unearth and the many mysteries that would both enthrall and frustrate her. She also did not bargain on the shocks she would have to deliver to family: ancestors who were executed (they backed the wrong side); murdered in their bed by a best friend; a missing RAF crewman; a doctor who has left his young wife and two small daughters to travel to Australia where he drowned; and a Gaiety girl who voyaged to South Africa with her wedding dress in her suitcase to marry a 'stage-door Johnny'.

Clare began her career as a journalist, went into publishing and then qualified as a pilot aged 50, excelling at each challenge. Since retiring she has co-founded the Dockland Sinfonia. She came from a background of illustrious ancestry, had family memorabilia and the advantage of lots of contacts from her journalism, including photographers. However, when Clare decided to research her and her husband's ancestors during Lockdown, she never imagined the amazing stories that she would uncover.

ON THIS DAY: June 10 is the 161st day of the year in the Gregorian calendar; 204 days left until the end of the year.

The month of June was named for the Roman goddess Juno, the goddess of marriage and the wife of the supreme deity Jupiter, though there are other etymologies as well.

- 1190** Third Crusade: Holy Roman Emperor Frederick I Barbarossa drowns while crossing the Saleph River (modern Turkey) leading an army to Jerusalem)
 - 1610** 1st Dutch settlers arrive (from NJ), to colonize Manhattan Island
 - 1692** The first victim of the Salem witch trials, Bridget Bishop, is hanged for witchcraft in the colony of Massachusetts
 - 1786** A landslide dam on the Da du River caused by earthquake ten days earlier collapses, killing 100,000 in the Sichuan province of China
 - 1829** The first Oxford and Cambridge University Boat Race takes place
 - 1857** Britain passes an act putting Canada on the decimal currency system. Britain remained on pounds, shilling and pence (£sd)
 - 1898** US Marines land in Cuba during the Spanish—American War
 - 1915** British/French troops conquer German colony of Cameroon
 - 1921** Prince Philip was born on Corfu, Greece. He died on April 9th 2021
 - 1922** Actress Judy Garland was born. She died on June 22nd 1969
 - 1940** Italy declares war on France and Great Britain as part of its Axis alliance with Nazi Germany
 - 1940** Norway surrenders to Nazi Germany after 62 days of fighting
 - 1977** Apple Computer ships its first Apple II computers
 - 2003** The Spirit Rover is launched, beginning NASA's Mars Exploration Rover mission

Brasted Place

Did you knowFrom about 1300, Brasted Place, a mansion and estate situated in the village of Brasted near Sevenoaks, was home to Brasted's Lords of the Manor. The original manor house was situated near the main road through the village, now the A25. However, in 1784 the new owner, Dr. John Turton, physician to King George III and Queen Charlotte, had the old house demolished and a new mansion, designed by the celebrated architect Robert Adam, was built on higher ground some way back from the road. Dr. Turton was keen to avoid a visit from the King who had shown a keen interest in the building of the new house, so he chose to build a smaller house rather than one of the grander designs proposed by Robert Adam. In that way, he could claim the house was not big enough for a royal visit! The king was clearly not offended, gifting the clock from Horse Guards Parade to the house, a feature which today is located on top of the old stables, reputedly because Dr. Turton didn't like the sound of the chimes. Dr. Turton also didn't like the existing road that cut through his estate near the new house, so he had New Road - which still runs between Sundridge and Ide Hill – built so that the old road could be closed.

Brasted Place has been home to many illustrious residents including; Sir Robert Heath, a Brasted man who rose to prominence as Attorney General in the reign of King Charles I – unsurprisingly he died in exile; the aforementioned Dr. Turton; Prince Louis Napoleon, later Emperor Napoleon III of France; William Tipping, a railway magnate, M.P and local benefactor who did much to improve Brasted village, and Leslie Urquhart, a mining entrepreneur in pre-revolutionary Russia who lost everything during the revolution and later founded the Mount Isa mines in Australia. In the post war years, Brasted Place served as a Theological College for 25 years and most recently the mansion house was converted into beautiful apartments.
